John Weldon (1676-1736) was Organist at New College, Oxford and not licensed for copying or performance 'Composer to the Chapel Royal'. He was a pupil of Henry Purcell and a coll Croft. Weldon came to the attention of the London establishment in 1 winning a competition to compose music for The Judgement of Par this success he was admitted to the Chapel Royal as a Gentlemar
